India is a young nation, with significant youth population. However more young people need to be more engaged in education, training, or employment. This significant challenge presents an incredible opportunity that our nation must seize.

What began as an ambitious vision driven by a simple idea has developed into targeted and tailored programmes focused on empowering and supporting youth. Working within communities, we have observed a significant shift in the aspirations of rural youth.

Our contextualized programs provide individuals with the information and skills they need to confidently navigate the real world. Our interventions are a powerful testament to our commitment to taking action. Our past initiatives have effectively aligned with various UN SDG goals and utilized a multi-stakeholder approach to implement sustainable solutions.

We continue to make strides in building capability (through the Make India Capable and the Future Ready Guidance programme), providing Opportunity (through the Antarprerana rural entrepreneurship programme), and fostering economic resilience.

Over the years, there has been a noticeable increase in household income following HHH's interventions, with growth in daily household income from USD 1.58 in FY 19-20 to USD 7.87 in FY 23-24.

Our resolve has been tested this year, but we are grateful to our dedicated team members, partners, and the organizations we have collaborated with for their unwavering support.

"I met a bunch of rowdy youths from the same area in Mumbai who went by the name Sansi. They misbehaved, spoke in their mother tongue, and disobeyed commands. I was upset when a senior came to visit and I had no control over the situation. After I told them about my struggles, they changed; they promised to get better and started becoming the most well-behaved pupils. In addition, Priya Sansi, a group member who was almost illiterate, had difficulties at first. She was a quiet, reserved individual. Thankfully, she was able to get the CSR Head to mentor her through Naya Savera of APL's one-on-one mentoring programme. She inspired others by fearlessly singing tables in class, surprising everyone after months of hard work. She soon achieved success because of her improved trust, and she was able to support her family by getting a job at Burger King. I still get chills from this story because it shows how resilient and transformational change can be."

A young person from a small rural village who was driven to end the cycle of poverty joined the HHH Make India Capable initiative and is now a self-assured, prosperous individual who walks tall. The individual, like many, is part of an HHH initiative to establish a formal, first-generation rural workforce that actively works to alleviate the poverty cycle.

The areas that we work in are categorized as underdeveloped districts with some designated as aspirational districts. The geographies grapple with stagnation and limited opportunities for its vast population living below the poverty line.

HHH has been utilizing the power of entrepreneurship, empowerment, and education for more than ten years to weave a revolutionary fabric that dismantles boundaries and brings hope to life.

HHH's modest beginnings in the past contributed to its amazing story today, which weaves together compelling facts and motivational tales to paint a vivid picture of change. Rural youth's lives have changed as a result of HHH's flagship programme, Make India Capable (MIC) - Youth Transformation Programme, which has given them the tools they need to find better jobs, earn more money each month, and escape poverty. The program's economic routes have produced sustainable livelihoods, enabling people to escape poverty and promote socio-economic growth in their local communities. In addition to emphasizing economic success,

the program's all-encompassing approach has fostered personal development, improved general well-being, and given participants a feeling of purpose and confidence.

Significant ripple effects result from these empowered people's ability to uphold established economic routes by building capability and acting as catalysts for socio-economic development in their local communities, encouraging others to strive for excellence.

Equipped with newly acquired knowledge and self-assurance, they go on their career paths and, as they go, break down barriers and open up new opportunities in their industries. Through the Future Ready Guidance programme at HHH, people can gain confidence and job skills that will help them pursue successful careers and motivate others. Women's employment prospects, financial literacy, and digital literacy have significantly improved for those living in rural areas as a result of their dedication to gender equality and women's empowerment. Understanding the importance of digital literacy being a huge opportunity, HHH has made facilitating market linkages for artisanal networks via digital public goods (ONDC) a priority starting this year. Our interventions are designed to unlock human potential, generate opportunities, and cultivate resilience.

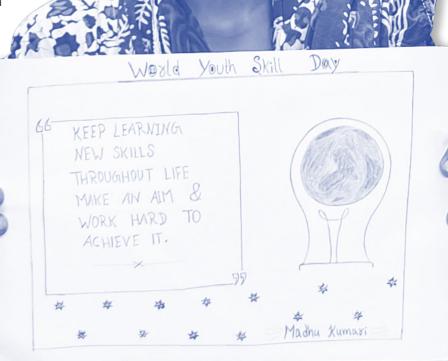
As part of this ambitious project, we aim to spotlight SHG groups actively engaged in arts and craft-based production activities. This project aims to identify and digitize unique product categories as per an agreed mandate. This involves a comprehensive phase-wise intervention encompassing product design, digitalization, pricing strategies, logistics optimization, and operational planning. The goal is to make these market-ready products easily accessible for purchase through digital means.

HHH is dedicated to empowering women and promoting gender equality to create a more inclusive society.

Women who have participated in HHH programmes have shown notable gains in their self-esteem, financial literacy, and computer literacy. These gains have opened up new career paths for them as well as chances to start their businesses and enhance the socioeconomic standing of their

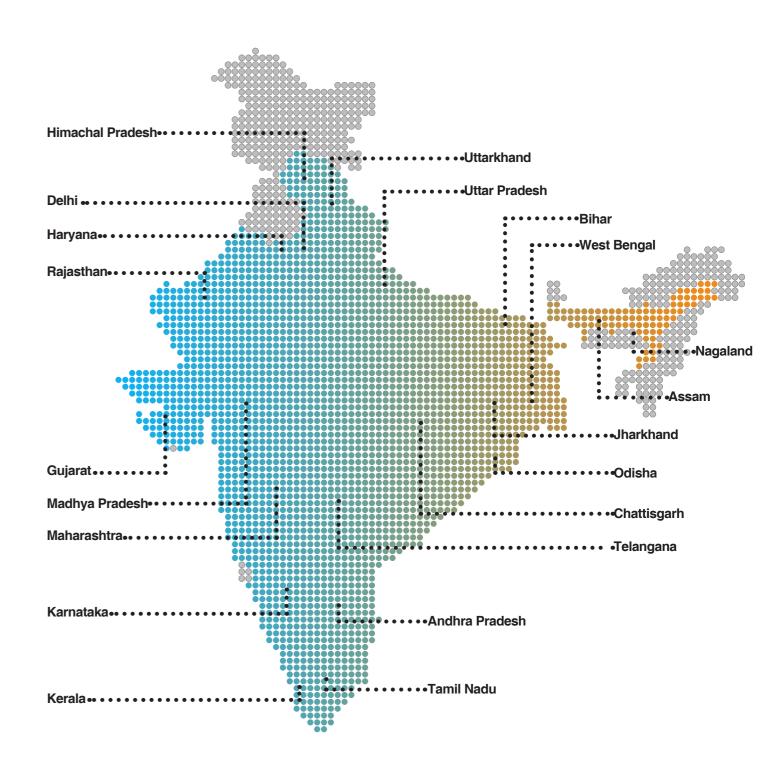

# Programs

Our programes are designed to lessen the social and economic obstacles that impoverished communities, mostly those in rural areas, must overcome. We provide individuals with the greatest vulnerabilities with access to opportunities and growth through training, skill development, empowerment, and other interventions. We carry out more than 80% of our interventions in rural areas. A fourth of these are located in districts with high aspirations, where they help advance important socio-economic metrics.

### Our Impact Driven Programs that Focus on Building Capability:

Head Held High

"Among the many youths I have trained, one story will remain etched in my memory forever. A student, who was identified as beneficiary and brought into the Make India Capable program, was selling coconuts in his village due to lack of opportunities and having passed only 4th grade exams. With a meagre household income of INR 3,000-4,000 per month, he joined our training with a determination to help his family. After a successful completion of our training he joined an established national restaurant chain, in Bengaluru as a layout manager. He joined as a floor supervisor in a renowned hospital and made a 10 times jump in his salary. We are in touch and he keeps updating me about his professional achievements. ### 1. Make India Capable

Our "Make India Capable" campaign was created after researching the issues that impoverished youngsters encounter. The goal of the youth transformation programme was to provide young people with the tools they needed to take charge of their lives and make choices that would enable them to escape poverty.

Rural education plays a pivotal role in resolving many of India's key problems - youth disillusionment, poverty, crime to name a few. It is the rural education scenario which is the yardstick of a nation's development Considering the bleak statistics, the youth who join the MIC workshops are mostly unschooled or have passed elementary grades. The Make India Capable (MIC) initiative transforms illiterate villagers into capable workers. It creates employment and business opportunities through uniquely designed life-skills training programs that are scalable and sustainable. It aims to move 2 million villagers out of the poverty trap by 2022. MIC differs from other youth transformation programmes in that it uses a three-pronged strategy to guarantee capability building that is both efficient and long-lasting. For this particular programme, our impact partners are Asian Paints, SEWA, and ACC.

### 2. Future-Ready Guidance

The absence of career resources and training to improve employability and develop 21st-century skills is a common problem facing marginalised youth. With a comprehensive strategy that incorporates social-emotional learning, skill development for work preparedness, contextual employment information, and customised career counseling, we hope to close this gap.

Sach Honge Sapne is a UNDP-led digital initiative to disseminate information on soft skills and job readiness as well as sector skills and opportunities. It is intended for young people who have little access to resources and career counseling. We created a strategy for the campaign's best possible reach and impact as UNDP's main partner in the endeavor. We created an educational video series involving industry experts and career counsellors to establish a connection with the intended audience. Youth who enrolled online were subsequently given individual outreach and career coaching sessions as a follow-up.

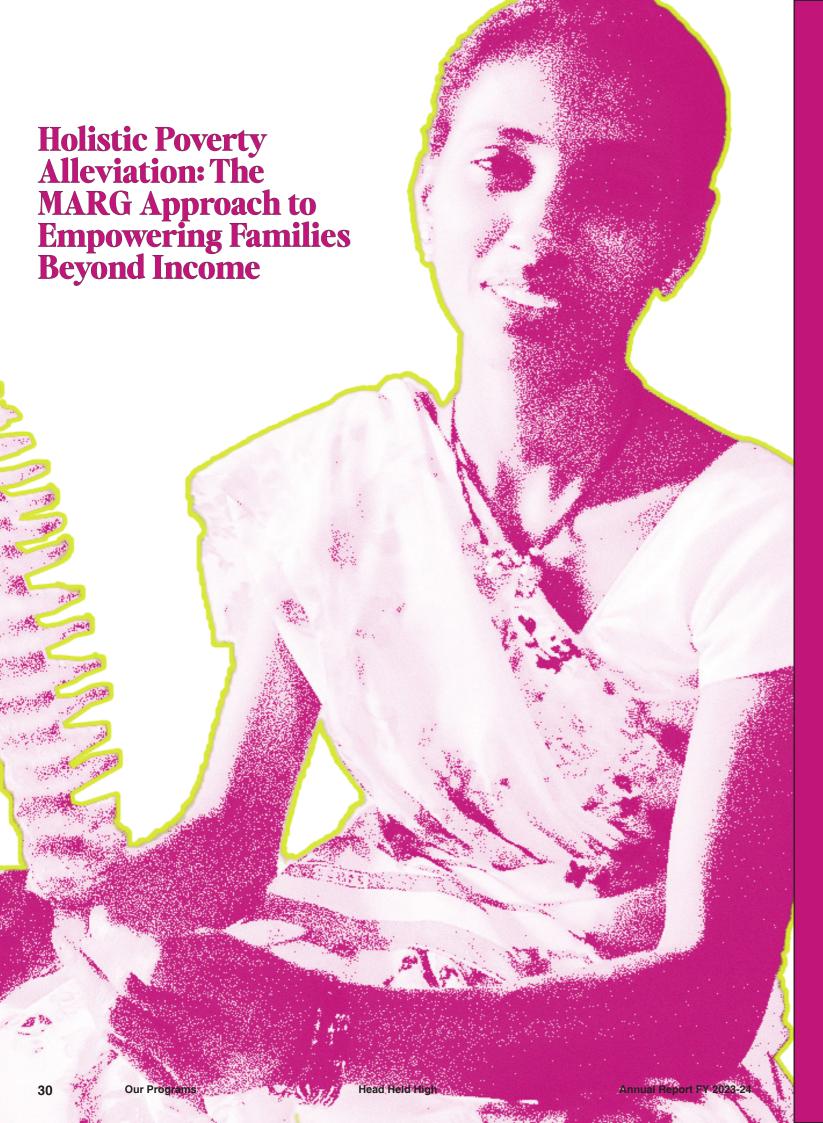
### 3. The Academy

The core of our training programmes is the Transformation Academy, located in Tumkur, Karnataka. The program's criteria are established in part by its master trainers and content developers. The group continuously modifies the programme to achieve better results and a bigger effect by drawing on ideas from the field. Our Train the Trainer (T3) programme, a 30-day immersive training for trainers that includes a stringent evaluation process, is also housed at the Academy. After finishing the course successfully, trainers are prepared to instruct our training programme. To help more individuals, we are willing to lend our expertise in curriculum development and contextualise it to meet the needs of possible partners.

### 4. Global Action on Poverty (GAP)

Our goal at Global Action on Poverty is to strengthen the influence of changemakers by creating an ecosystem of socially conscious people and organizations. Working with changemakers who offer answers for the areas of Education, Agriculture, Health, Water & Sanitation, Financial Inclusion, and Energy, GAP makes it possible to implement the SDGs from the ground up. In addition to attempting to establish a network of change agents capable of helping the impoverished escape their situation, we also want to provide them with the tools they need to help the organisation achieve its goals

Empowering Marginalized Youth Through Digital Career Guidance and Skill Development Rural education plays a pivotal role in resolving many of India's key problems – youth disillusionment, poverty, crime.



### 5. MARG

Our needs assessment methodology, known as MARG, uses a framework that incorporates income along with other characteristics like social protection, health, education, and more to determine the level of poverty experienced by families. MARG acknowledges that poverty is multifaceted and cannot be adequately addressed with an incomebased strategy alone. Before beginning MARG, the family in question completes a self-evaluation. Next, we develop a poverty-reduction plan tailored to their individual needs. A community mentor steps in to help carry out the plan and provides support as needed, particularly in securing social welfare schemes.

### **Setting-up Community Response Centers:**

Community Response Centres (CRC) are actual locations from which we may address issues that impoverished rural and urban populations face. We begin by evaluating each family's position concerning multidimensional poverty indicators using our MARG framework. Beyond that, we help create safety nets to protect members from unfavorable economic events by putting chances for skill development, employment, and entrepreneurship within their reach. These interventions, which concentrate on kids and families, aim to improve the community as a whole over time.

"I got an incredible opportunity to be a mentor to a little girl who had been through a lot and had never been in a classroom. ### Innovations That Focus On Building Opportunity:

### 1. Rural Entrepreneurship: Antarprerna

Antarprerna, or "inner motivation," is a programme designed to encourage group and individual enterprise in areas with little access to the economy. We use collaborations, in addition to our in-depth training experience and industry knowledge, to link rural residents especially women with chances to earn a living. Rural women are concentrated in low-skilled, low- productivity, and low or unpaid jobs with long working hours, poor working conditions and limited social protection. They are more likely to work as unpaid contributing family members which means their work is largely unrecognized or undervalued. Women in rural society and especially in farming have always been an "invisible work force". One of the major policy concerns in recent years has been the decline in the number of women workers in the Indian labour market. Women's contribution to

gross domestic product is very low in India (18 per cent) as compared to countries like China (41

per cent), Vietnam (40 per cent), Japan (33 per cent), and Sri Lanka (29 per cent) (Mckinsey Global Institute, 2018). Across the globe, the development sector has produced enough evidence to show that changing a community begins with empowering its women. Antarprerna, our rural entrepreneurship programme, aim at nurturing place-based economic opportunities. They allow women in a given community to come together for group enterprises, creating sustained income and job security for them—all within the vicinity of their homes.

### **Programs Under ANTARPRERANA**

### i. Women Collectives

The fact that women in rural areas are unable to travel too far from their homes for employment gave rise to the idea of establishing women collectives under Antarprerna. Typically, an Antarprerna Centre is a collective venture that hires local women to produce textiles and other handcrafted goods. We collaborate with partners to make sure these goods can be sold and provide money for women. Scaling women's empowerment can be done economically with the help of women's collectives. For a considerable amount of time, these groups have provided rural women with social solidarity, resilience, and capital. Women's collectives provide financial access and social mobilisation to empower women in rural India.

### ii. Micro Entrepreneurship

For many people and families in rural areas where local industry or farming is insufficient to provide a living, self-employment can be a means of achieving financial stability. We support prospective rural entrepreneurs in starting and operating small businesses that benefit their local communities through Antarprerna.

This support includes a variety of interventions such as training in developing an entrepreneurial attitude, mentorship, funding availability, and assistance with developing market strategies and connections for expanding businesses.

### 2. Social Innovation for Youth

We think that to address some of the most important issues of our day, the world needs the ideas and enthusiasm of young people. Through workshops, idea incubation, opportunities for collaboration, training, and other means, we hope to encourage social entrepreneurship among the youth.

### ii. TASK

TASK is a not-for-profit organization established by the Government of Telangana to bring synergy among the industry, academia, and government. This program focusses on three main pillars- Education, Employability, and Entrepreneurship. The core objective is to skill students to make them more employable and develop an entrepreneurial mindset.

The Flagship program on entrepreneurship, i4TS (Innovating for Telangana State) - Samajika Avishkaranalu Saralamina Jivithaniki (Social Innovation for Simplifying Lives)", anchored by Head Held High Foundation builds to develop an entrepreneural mindset and appearage around 20,000.



Interventions that Focus on Economic Resilience

The objective of the Economic Resilience intervention for households in poverty is to facilitate their transition towards economic self-sufficiency. This approach is grounded in a 'whole of family' perspective, acknowledging that poverty affects entire households and that addressing their needs collectively yields greater effectiveness.

The objective of addressing poverty at the household level is to provide enduring solutions. Rather than focusing solely on individual requirements, the program aims to tackle the underlying causes of poverty, thereby fostering sustainable change within households. This approach aligns with the program's overarching goal of promoting economic resilience through comprehensive and lasting interventions that empower families as a whole.

### Programs part of cial Innovation for Youth

### **Enabling Social Security Access**

In India, numerous social security programmes address housing, work, healthcare, education, and other aspects of daily living. However, their intended beneficiaries don't always reap the benefits. The process of gaining access to these schemes can be difficult, and many of them are unaware of them. To increase involvement in this initiative, our teams on the ground help applicants fill out forms, communicate with local government authorities, and conduct door-to-door awareness drives.



# Priorities



### Youth Transformation

The proof of concept for Head Held High started with an emphasis on youth transformation. We have come a long way from our initial programme, which brought eight young people together with the hope of empowering them to alter the narrative that was defined by their poverty. By enhancing their skills and providing access to engagement opportunities, **HHH empowers youth**. In addition to offering instruction and training that is pertinent to the social and commercial environments, we also assist local actors in establishing contexts where youth can develop and make significant contributions.

Our approach focuses on transformative assets that need to be developed locally to support youth in becoming responsible, empowered, and global citizens. Together, these resources include programme outcomes that highlight the needs of young people and assist trainers in determining the key factors that influence Capability and Productivity.

Cross-sectoral programming that maximizes future contributions to society is made easier with the use of a young lens like this. Our youth programme targets a specific group based on several characteristics because contexts vary.

Our flagship initiative, "Make India Capable," was created with a set of guidelines in mind that may be adjusted to the beneficiaries' geographic and demographic circumstances. With more than **18,000 young people** signing up for and finishing the programme, their future is full of opportunities to break free from the cycle of poverty.

### **Building Youth Capabilities** and Opportunities

To reduce the likelihood or effects of poverty, youth need to contribute towards changing their narrative. By fostering essential skills that profoundly change young people's perceptions of their roles and responsibilities in the world, HHH conducts comprehensive training.

Academic or professional training on its own cannot guarantee a smooth transition to the workforce or the development of socially contributing individuals. In addition, life and soft skills arev necessary for young people from underprivileged backgrounds to take care of their health, make wise decisions, etc.

Educational establishments typically support rote-learning methods with little room for discussion. This outdated method stifles effective communication, discourages critical thinking, and makes young people less capable of navigating the social, political, and economic realities of the twenty-first century. It's concerning that there aren't enough jobs to match the increase in labour supply. As a result, investments need to be concentrated on fostering innovation, entrepreneurship, and the development of jobs.

In addition to providing them with the necessary training, it's critical to expose them to educational materials that show them how to apply their newfound abilities in practical settings.

Employability training and career guidance were provided to over 1,50,000 youth. They were prepared for interviews and matched to suitable sectors based on their talents and interests.

The industries that matched the **100% of youth trained** in a variety of skills were manufacturing, IT, retail, services, etc.

An approach including multiple stakeholders is necessary to tackle poverty and inequality, including the government, commercial sector, civil society, and academics. In order to provide beneficiaries with long-term results, HHH found pertinent partners.



### **Entrepreneurship**

The idea that entrepreneurship affects ending poverty and enhancing human development and people's quality of life is supported by evidence-based studies. Additionally, it highlights the close connection between entrepreneurship and reducing poverty. Despite annual government and non-governmental investment, poverty remains an enormous and persistent global issue. Although many people and families view this type of investment as a vital lifeline, not enough of them are being lifted out of poverty as a result of it. Consequently, it is necessary to investigate other techniques and solutions. One possible route out of poverty for individuals who are suffering is through entrepreneurship, or starting enterprises.

Are programmes encouraging entrepreneurship and effective labour market policy for the underprivileged? In developing nations, a significant portion of labourers are self-employed, primarily as own-account contractors without salaried staff a term that is frequently used interchangeably with "microentrepreneur." In the developing world, the proportion of all workers has not changed significantly during the previous 20 years. To increase workers' wages and decrease poverty, entrepreneurship programmes offer access to capital (or assets), consulting, and networking services, in addition to business training. Programme designs differ, which may have an impact on the results they provide.

Head Held High creates initiatives to support, encourage, and grow entrepreneurship. Our initiatives have specifically focused on women with distinctive abilities that reflect their origin and culture. HHH has prioritized youth in addition to women, who have served as focus groups. More than just boosting the economy, empowered women and young entrepreneurs are at the forefront of societal reform.

Encourage a culture of Women's Empowerment When women succeed in the workplace, they break down barriers and redefine social standards. Their achievements encourage a culture of women's empowerment by serving as an inspiration to other women. As a result, HHH has consistently supported female collectives to encourage female entrepreneurship. Women now have the much-needed space to develop and follow their entrepreneurial inclinations thanks to collective social enterprises.

More than 2500 young people founded their own companies, and received encouragement to become business owners. Additionally, HHH assisted more than 500 women in collectives that brought in INR 6,158 a month from their businesses. Moreover, microentrepreneurial projects assisted more than 1,000 women. Collectives were also enabled through access to the digital marketplace for their products and given relevant training as well as guidance.

The ONDC platform was made accessible to **300** women in collectives and is paving a path to bringing in more and more entrepreneurs. With the advent of COVID-19, the problem of poverty didn't seem to be resolved, and in fact, it got worse. In the age of global digitalization, entrepreneurs have flourished, using all forms of digitalization to accomplish their best performances. An inclusive marketplace such as ONDC allows them to maintain competitive pricing while expanding their market reach. Additionally, it helps them increase their profit margins and guarantees that these entrepreneurs do not have to pay a premium for the end-to-end interface that potential customers demand.

The beneficiaries' income and economic traction serve as proof of the success of HHH's entrepreneurship programmes. For the beneficiaries that HHH works with, self-employment remains a significant source of employment and income, and increasing the productivity of the self-employed is crucial for reducing poverty.

### **Economic Resilience**

The focus of many definitions of economic resilience is restricted to one's capacity for swift recovery following a disruption. But when it comes to economic growth, the goal of economic resilience is to better equip people to foresee, withstand, and recover from any kind of shock, disruption, or stress that they may encounter. The impoverished rely on markets much like everyone else. They rely on markets to sell the items they make and to buy supplies when they're low. They are impacted by laws and rules from the government and work in both formal and informal labour and land markets. They need a variety of services. They are involved in several extremely volatile markets, particularly those that are connected to international markets. Price swings and technology advancements happen in these markets in ways that the impoverished cannot hope to control.

How can we lessen the instability of impoverished households' lives? How can we strengthen their resilience? Poor people can lessen their losses from natural disasters or changes in the economy

by developing economic resilience. Households and organizations that are resilient may endure shocks that result from wide-ranging economic downturns, diminished competitiveness, and shrinking market segments. Poor individuals frequently lack awareness of the government and civil society organizations' initiatives designed to help them develop economic resilience. Even if they do possess some basic knowledge, they do not know how to apply it appropriately. Although it may seem quite simple, this is a crucial element that is overlooked, and HHH concentrates on educating the recipients instead.

HHH has worked to provide the beneficiaries with this information through a number of its programmes. Using an estimated 422 Cr as the economic worth of social entitlement, HHH has created an internal contextualized programme to make the beneficiary:

# The Year That Was

Over the past year, we have introduced a range of innovative programmes and initiatives aimed at achieving long-term outcomes for our current activities. Through strategic collaboration with like-minded organizations, we have significantly extended our reach, efficiently leveraging existing resources to avoid redundant efforts.

These collective endeavors are driving transformative change, particularly in alleviating poverty and uplifting rural communities, heralding a new era of sustainable development and empowerment.

## Strategies for Developing Capabilities and Creating Opportunities



Traditional handicrafts and artisanal skills despite offering a source of income, poses challenges such as market access, technology adoption and skill enhancement hindering their economic potential. Apart from a lack of economic opportunities, high gender disparities persist in these areas, with women often facing limited decision-making power and reduced access to educational opportunities. Empowering women economically can have a cascading effect on the entire community, fostering a more inclusive and equitable society. This project aims to identify and digitize unique product categories as per an agreed mandate. This involves a comprehensive phase-wise intervention encompassing product design, digitalization, pricing strategies, logistics optimization, and operational planning.

The goal is to make these market-ready products easily accessible for purchase through digital means. As part of this ambitious project, we began the implementation with a women collective group in Dhanbad Jharkhand supported by Tata Power. Tiger grass is found growing along steep hills, sandy banks of rivers and damp steep banks along ravines and is found in abundance here. Specialized designers aided in conceptualizing products made from tiger grass that could be used by urban settlers. These designs were then translated to products with assistance from our trainees and sent for garnering market feedback. Upon this, the products will be shot aesthetically and made available for sale and all proceeds will go directly to the artisans. Other artisanal products were also identified to be sold on the platform and modeling them as contemporary things to improve their salability is also part of the process.

The proposed project, apart from digitizing the artisanal products, will also focus on providing financial assistance to sellers for setting up gainful self-employment ventures/micro-enterprises and focus on providing bank linkages to Self Help Groups and their members.

### **About ONDC**

India, more than 12 million sellers earn their livelihood by selling or reselling products and services. However, only 15,000 of these sellers (0.125% of the total) have enabled e-commerce. E-retail has been out of reach for the majority of sellers, especially from small towns and rural areas.

ONDC recognizes the unique opportunity to increase e-retail penetration from the existing 4.3% to its maximum potential in India. Their mission is to dramatically increase e-commerce penetration in the country by enabling population-scale inclusion of all types and sizes of sellers.

### **About 1Bridge**

A village commerce network for products & digital services that bridges access, choice and convenience gaps for rural consumers, a shared sales, financing and delivery network for our corporate partners—enabled through a network of village entrepreneurs operating our assisted commerce tech platform. Future Ready Guidance programme (FRG) is an essential component of HHH efforts. It acts as a launching pad for beneficiaries, giving them priceless insights into the working world and fostering their feelings of purpose and self-awareness. Equipped with newly acquired knowledge and self-assurance, they go on their career paths and, as they go, break down barriers and open up new opportunities in their industries. Through the Future Ready Guidance programme at HHH, people can gain confidence and job skills that will help them pursue successful careers and motivate others. Women employment prospects, financial literacy, and digital literacy have significantly improved for those living in rural areas as a result of their dedication to gender equality and women's empowerment.

Women who have participated in HHH programmes have shown notable gains in their self-esteem, financial literacy, and computer literacy. These gains have opened up new career paths for them as well as chances to start their businesses and enhance the socioeconomic standing of their communities. HHH has lit a flame of change by tackling the particular obstacles faced by rural women, resulting in the creation of first-generation rural women entrepreneurs.

The Future Ready Guidance (FRG) program intervention went a step further on providing career guidance & counseling to Women in ITIs.

The "WeSTEM" program was done in partnership with UNWomen & Madhya Pradesh State Skill Development & Employment Generation Board (MPSSDEGB). UN Women India's 'WeSTEM' program aims to empower women in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM). The initiative is focused on motivating and supporting young women already enrolled in higher or vocational STEM education courses in select tribal areas of Madhya Pradesh, India. Through 'WeSTEM', we're enhancing their employability

skills, preparing them for the jobs

of the future, and opening

higher education, internships, apprenticeships, and rewarding career opportunities in STEM industries. The goals is to provide the CG&C services along with an exposure to robotics as a career stream for 3500 women across 11 districts.

We also conducted "Train the Trainer program" for 28,000 teachers in Karnataka on the Code Unnati, spearheaded by SAP, is a corporate to citizen digital literacy & IT skills development initiative, aiming at "inclusive" and "equitable" sociology-economic development. Developed in collaboration with UNDP. It is a partnership to empower youth and women for future employability skills and entrepreneurship across the four districts of Karnataka - Dakshina Kannada, Raichur, Bengaluru Rural, and Ramanagara. The initiative provides high-end tech infrastructure to collaborating engineering colleges and offers technical training to students on emerging technologies such as Artificial Intelligence, Machine Learning, Cloud Computing, etc. Code Unnati believes that digital has the enormous power of "inclusive" growth.

In the year 2023, Indian Hotels Company (IHCL), India's largest hospitality brand had announce its partnership with Head Held High. The collaboration focussed on social progress and inclusive growth, and is in line with IHCL ESG + framework of Paathya. As part of the collaboration, IHCL will establish skill centres in select locations across the country to train youth for employment across industries, including hospitality. We expanded our partnership with Indian Hotels Company Limited by expanding the footprint to 10 states & 15 districts of the Make India Capable Hospitality Program . We also crossed a milestone of graduating 10,000 youth from this program since the start of the partnership in 2018.

In a district plagued by limited access to education, employment, and participation in decision-making processes, this project aims to break down barriers and open doors to a brighter future.

### **Empowerment Through Education: An Inspiring Story**

Posha Ram, a 19-year-old from Rampura hamlet in Rajasthan's Sirohi district, has always aspired to better his own life and provide for his family. But his aspirations appeared far away, with only a 12th-grade education and no real direction in life. That all changed when a local mobilizer informed him about the Make India Capable Programme.

Posha Ram, driven by curiosity, signed up for a 120-day course at JKLC Sirohi, which is managed by the Head Held High Foundation. He gained the knowledge and self-assurance he needed from the programme to completely change his life. Posha Ram was one of the cohort's poorest students, but his commitment to hard work and determination stood out. He transformed into a different person after mastering teamwork, leadership, time management, and communication.

Despite the challenging training, Posha Ram remained adamant about succeeding. Taking full use of this opportunity, he studied hard and practised new talents for several hours. His tenacity paid off as he finished the course with distinction. The timid and unsettled Rampura youngster had grown into a self-assured, capable young man who was prepared to face the world.

Posha Ram is currently employed at Barbeque Nation in Ahmedabad, where she receives a monthly salary of 10,000 rupees, food, and lodging. In addition to giving him a steady income, this work enables him to financially support his family. By taking on household duties, he has relieved his parents of some of their burdens and provided a good example for his younger siblings.

Posha Ram's story serves as evidence of the transformational potential of instruction and training. He acknowledges the continuous support of the Head Held High Foundation and the JKLC Sirohi CSR team for helping him transform from a young man with limited chances to a young man with a promising future. His tale of resiliency, tenacity, and hope encourages others to see the possibilities in themselves and go after their goals despite all obstacles.

Following her training, Sikha looked for work in the hospitality industry and was hired as a Crew Member at McDonald's in Haridwar, where she would receive a competitive pay of 12,000 rupees per month. ### Why We Exist

"Where the mind is without fear and the Head is Held High"



Harinath is of the many who are relentlessly working towards the vision of Head Held High. Our vision is to eradicate rural poverty globally, beginning in India. As lofty as the vision is, our stories help us believe that we can realize it. In our model, the primary force for creating the change is the individual. A transformed individual, when given access to viable economic pathways, can emerge from and lead their family out of poverty. Our roadmap for driving change for individuals, families and communities is based on this core belief in the power of agency. Hence all the programs that we design and contextualize focus on empowering the individual and enable them with relevant skills.

Even if our training programme is well-designed, we still have trouble drawing in the bulk of people who really need it. Due to financial hardships, duties to their families, cultural conventions, or lifestyle choices, many prospective trainees choose not to attend. We are unable to connect with and support a sizable percentage of beneficiaries due to these obstacles.

There are many obstacles to overcome while working in rural regions since the necessity of training for transformation is not fully understood by the locals, and financial constraints make matters more difficult. Many potential trainees are prevented from participating in our well-designed programmes by obstacles like financial limitations, family responsibilities, cultural standards, and lifestyle concerns. The trainees' desire to take on difficulties and dedication to learning with the aim of achieving both personal and financial transformation is essential to the success of our enterprise. For our programmes to be sustainable and effective, we must overcome these challenges through strategic planning and resource allocation.

### What keeps us going? Stories of impact. And we would like to share some with you:

**Adil Mansuri:** was part of the the project that is located all over India in 10 + districts. It is a 180 days immersive program where we focus to transform the life of the trainees by providing them soft skills and Placement.

While there are many interesting field stories, our trainee Adil Mansuri has one particularly memorable one. After deploying this trainee, I went to his house and found that there was no electricity. Since they hadn't paid their payments, the department had severed the connection. Poverty had

created an utterly dismal scenario. Seated before me was a disheartened person with few options to rescue himself and his family from the annoyance. He was excited to take up the opportunity after I gave him the rundown of the programme and its possible results. This trainee is currently earning a good living in a five-star hotel after finishing our course.

**Suman Singh:** was part of the Make India Capable program supported by ACC

The volunteers experience poverty-related hardships and are frequently knocked down. There is no way out of this dreadful circumstance, and there is no end in sight. They lack the fundamental knowledge that formal education would impart and are frequently lacking in confidence as a result of their environment. One incidence worth mentioning involves Suman Singh, a trainee from the ACC initiative. She had trouble communicating at first, but she persevered and finally became the main breadwinner for her family, which had a significant impact on our trainee.

Vijay Taj Tirupathi: was part of the 45 days work readiness module that is designed to provide skills and knowledge about hospitality, grooming, communication and digital skills to the youths age group 18-25 years with special attention to affirmative action.

Among the participants in this batch, Vijay from Taj Tirupati was exceptional. In addition to being proactive and forthcoming, he assisted his classmates and showed a great deal of empathy for others. He didn't want to confine himself to the platform or the training that had been provided to him; instead, he was interested in the bigger picture of Head Held High. He looked for chances and preparatory materials that would deepen his understanding. He chose to work with HHH after the batch graduated and joined the SelL project at Nellore.

Transformation is possible when individuals seize opportunities, overcoming challenges to create a better future for themselves and their families.

With our offices now opening in multiple cities and more projects and partnerships on the horizon, we are excited to keep taking the leap and hold on to the belief that we will make it.

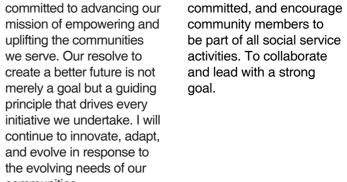
